Wanting the very best for our children, we will go to great lengths to advocate for their needs. And I will bring this perspective with me to Thoreau every day. As a student-focused leader, I never lose sight of why we're here, and my decision-making process always begins with: "Is this best for kids?" Understanding and supporting the social-emotional needs of children while holding high academic expectations is a core belief of mine.

I also have experience forging productive, collaborative school-community partnerships. Having recently completed a second 3-year term as member, Secretary, and Vice Chair of the Ashburnham-Westminster Regional School Committee, I appreciate the impactful benefits of a healthy relationship. As a board member, it was a priority to be visible and accessible to all stakeholder groups. To me, the position meant more than creating policies and crafting budgets; it was about listening and engaging in collaborative discussions on topics to improve the system and enrich the educational experience for our students. Through this work, opportunities for students grow and outcomes are strengthened. The stronger the connection between home and school, the stronger student achievement will be. I intend to carry this mindset with me to my new position.

As with school board service, being visible and accessible is essential to the success of a Principal. Looking ahead, partnerships will elevate us in the upward trajectory of success. I'll be communicating often with you through multiple platforms. Be on the lookout for my weekly newsletter in your inbox every Sunday. Throughout the year, regular coffee hours will offer informal ways to collaborate. This summer, you'll find me in the building Tuesday-Thursday most weeks, for opportunities to meet with me one-on-one, either in-person or virtually.
